The months of Tevet and Shevat bring us deep into the rainy winter months in the Land of Israel. Their names are derived from Akkadian during the Babylonian Captivity. Tevet is derived from Araḫ Ṭebētum, the "muddy month." Shevat has a fascinating origin; "Šabātu" is believed to mean "strike," a reference to the heavy rains characteristic of the season. This etymology highlights the deep connection between ancient cultures and their environment.

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### RABBI REMARKS

January first and the secular New Year are upon us; hopefully, it was a safe and healthy new year for each of you. As Americans, we are tied to our Gregorian calendar. As Jews, we are also tied to our Hebrew calendar. We know that Rosh Hashanah occurs each autumn, just after "back to school." We know that Hanukkah is in the winter, sometime after Thanksgiving; Pesach falls in the spring, sometime around Spring Break!

We are tied to our calendar. On February 13th, we will experience the holiday of Tu B'Shevat. Rabbinic literature teaches us that Tu B'Shevat is "the new year for the trees," or perhaps the birthday of the trees. Growing up, I was always told that the 15th of Shevat is the "jewish arbor day." This statement is incomplete. The American Arbor Day was founded solely to foster the planting of trees, completely lacking the larger significance and breadth of spirit that characterizes Tu B'Shevat.

Tu B'Shevat is an agricultural holiday. This is when the rainy season in Israel is ending, as Pesach approaches. The trees in Israel begin to sprout flowers and fruits. Tu B'Shevat is a holiday of ethical and moral implications. As Dr. Seuss' Lorax would tell us "I am the Lorax. I speak for the trees. I speak for the trees for the trees have no tongues." It is a holiday of advocacy and stepping up for those who cannot do so.

Tu B'Shevat is a holiday of spiritual awakening. At this time of the year, the coldest time on the calendar, we are just beginning to have light, as the days are lengthening. The mystical rabbis teach us that Tu B'Shevat is when the trees awaken, and the sap begins to flow; similarly, this is when our souls begin to awaken, and our spiritual sap begins to flow. We begin to look forward to the remembrance of our redemption and the coming of Pesach. Carefully, we begin to assess where we fall in Creation. Where are we in our relationship with the Creator? Where are we in our relationship with nature?

In this life on earth, we must contemplate, confront, and accept The Creation. We did not initiate or conceive of this world; we were born into it. All of this happened through our Creator's intention. How will we deal with and learn from it? (continued on page 4)

20th-century Jewish philosopher, Martin Buber, offers the following meditation, in which he puts our relationship with nature into perspective:

#### I contemplate a tree.

I can accept it as a picture: a rigid pillar in a flood of light, or splashes of green traversed by the gentleness of the blue-silver ground.

I can feel it as movement: the flowing veins around the sturdy, striving core, the sucking of the roots, the breathing of the leaves, the infinite.

Commerce with earth and air - and the growing itself in its darkness.


I can assign it to a species and observe it as an instance, with an eye to Construction and its way of life...

I can dissolve it into a number, into a pure relation between numbers, and eternalize it. Throughout all of this the tree remains my object and has its place and its time span, its kind and condition.

But it can also happen, if will and grace are joined, that as I contemplate the tree I am drawn into a relation, and the tree ceases to be an It. The power of exclusiveness has seized me... Whatever belongs to the tree is included: its form and its mechanics, its colors and its chemistry, its conversation with the elements and its conversation with the stars – all this in its entirety.

The tree is no impression, no play of my imagination, no aspect of a mood; it confronts me bodily and has to deal with me as I must deal with it – only differently.

During these winter months and the coming Tu B'Shevat, may we each find a connection to the natural world, in which we feel connected to the Creator in each of us. May we be reminded of our relationship with God as we are awakened to the world around us.



### BOARD UPDATE

As you know one of my jobs as Temple President is to write a message in the Temple Bulletin. I feel it is important for the congregation to get to know all the Temple leadership, so I have asked each member of the Executive Committee to write a Bulletin article in my place. This month's article is written by **Josh Corngold**, Temple Israel's Vice President.



Recent survey data indicates that religious identification among U.S. adults has been in steady decline in the first few decades of the new millennium. In a 2020 Gallup poll, 47% of Americans said they belong to a house of worship. That represents a 23 percentage point drop since 1999 and the lowest percentage ever reported by Gallup. Meanwhile, a Pew Research Center poll released in early 2024 found that 28% of U.S. adults identify as "religiously unaffiliated" (i.e. they consider themselves to be atheist, agnostic, or "nothing in particular"). This makes "religiously unaffiliated" the largest individual religious cohort in the nation— outnumbering those who consider themselves Catholics or Evangelicals.

Certainly, the Reform Jewish community is not immune to these social trends. And yet, at present, Temple Israel is showing very encouraging signs of growth! As Board President Brina Reinstein recently reported, over 59 families have joined Temple Israel in the past two years. Enrollment in Shorashim—Temple Israel's religious school program—is up 50% over the same period. And since August, seven of our members have been called to the Torah as Bnai Mitzvah.

Progress on the NextDor project continues apace! Fundraising for the project is now at over \$12 million and counting. And groundbreaking for the beautiful, new, energy-efficient building is slated for the coming summer.

In short, this is an exciting and momentous time to be a part of the Temple Israel family. We have powerful momentum on our side. I look forward to seeing you in Temple soon.

### NEXTDOR UPDATE

December 2024 / Kislev 5785

We are pleased to report a significant development in our NextDor process: The Jewish Federation of Tulsa has agreed to provide a temporary home for Temple Israel while we are "between buildings."

We are grateful to the Federation leadership for their support, and look forward to being on the Zarrow Campus. Once we are out of our existing building (probably sometime early in the summer of 2025), we will hold services and religious school on the campus. We will also be able to take advantage of the Federation's meeting rooms and other facilities.

Since the Federation is providing space at no charge, as part of their mission to support the Tulsa Jewish community, being on the Zarrow Campus is a major financial savings for Temple Israel. Instead of having to rent space for services and school, or having to move from place to place, we now will only have to rent office space for our staff (and, yes, we are working on finding a donor for that as well!).

We know that most of our members are quite familiar with the Zarrow Campus, and are confident that it will be convenient for our community.

We will share more specific information about the project timing – including when we will leave our current building – as soon as we have it. It is a complex process, and we want to make sure we get every step right.
