RABBI REMARKS

One of our greatest successes which came out of the COVID-19 Pandemic is our weekly Thursday Learning on Zoom. What began at a time when we were throwing things together online just to maintain a sense of community and connectedness, has evolved into a fantastic community of dedicated learners. We have a core group of individuals who carve out time in their schedule, specifically to engage in thoughtful, provocative discussions, and

meaningful debate. Over the past five years we have studied traditional rabbinic texts, Jewish values, Hot Topics, an exploration of Reform Judaism, modern Jewish thought, and a deep dive into differing perspectives on Jewish theology. Most recently, celebrated modern Jewish scholar, Rabbi Jeffrey Salkin has become our teacher. Right now, he is our teacher only through his written word, as we have been working our way through his latest book, *Tikkun HaAm: Repairing Our People- Israel and the Crisis of Liberal Judaism*. We look forward to learning together in person.

Rabbi Jeff Salkin will be our Scholar-in-Residence for the weekend of March 28-30. Rabbi Salkin has a loving relationship with our Temple Israel Family; he was our visiting Scholar in 2012, and is incredibly excited to, once again, bring his Torah, teaching, musicality, and engagement to our community. Furthermore, he hopes to bring a few additional treats along the way. Please mark your calendars for this weekend of learning, worship, music and discussion:

Friday evening, March 28, 6:00pm: "Praying With Fire: An Interactive Learning Service."

For modern Jews, prayer is a challenge, and the words of the liturgy don't often speak to us. It doesn't have to be that way. Join Rabbi Salkin on his latest quest – to dig deeply into the Jewish soul, and to lift up the prayers in a way that you have never experienced before. From an upcoming book, to be published by the Reform movement.

Shabbat morning, March 29, 10:30am: "How Do You Reboot American Judaism?"

October 7 created a new version of American Judaism. What might it look like? And where are we going from here? Join Rabbi Jeff Salkin, as he does a deep dive into contemporar⁴y American Jewish identity – based on his recent book, Tikkun HaAm/Repairing Our People Israel and the Crisis of Liberal Judaism.

Saturday evening, March 29, Time TBD: "How Does it Feel?" The religious vision of Bob Dylan.

A rabbi and a cantor walk into a bar and sing and talk Bob Dylan together.

A prominent American Jewish thought leader, who has included a chapter on Dylan in his new book on American Jewish identity. A prominent cantor, who is one of the spiritual leaders of a major American synagogue, and Dylan-phile. They join together, sing Dylan's songs, and study those texts -- looking for all the religious messages about what it means to live meaningfully in our time. Exploring the religious roots of Bob Dylan's music — from Jewish to evangelical Christian — and maybe back again.

Sunday morning, March 30, 10:00am: "Is Trump 2.0 Good for the Jews?"

We recall the classic curse: "May you live in interesting times." We do, and they are painful and confusing. What can we say about the rise of antisemitism, on the left and the right; the rise of authoritarianism, the struggle over Jewish values in the public square? Rabbi Jeff Salkin lays it out for us. Join us for a talk that will make you think.

Join us in advance, at 9:30, as we enjoy our Brotherhood Breakfast. There is no cost for the breakfast, as it is included as part of our Scholar-in-Residence weekend.

Rabbi Jeff Salkin's book, *Tikkun Ha'Am*: *Repairing our People – Reimagining Liberal Judaism in America*, has been the focus of our most recent online learning series.

As Angela Davis said, "I am no longer accepting the things I cannot change – I am changing the things I cannot accept." That's our job. That's our mitzvah. We must stay active, stay informed, and speak out when we see things we cannot accept. That work is more important today than it has been in a long time. As Pirkei Avot teaches, we are not obligated to finish the work, but we are also not free to abandon it.



Your Social Justice Committee has two upcoming opportunities to get involved. Keep an eye on the bulletin board in the Temple lobby for an opportunity to help the Parent-Child Center around Purim. Then, on April 17, we'll be doing a screening of the movie Shared Legacies, which explores the historic partnership between Black and Jewish civil rights activists. Zionism, the World, & Israel after October 7th

The ARZA/ Israel Brotherhood Breakfast Sunday April 27th, and ARZA Shabbat the following Friday, May 2nd, bookends Israel Memorial and Independence Days. Then the JFT Yom Ha'atzmaut event follows on Sunday, May 4th. And all this, right after Pesach, is in the middle of the WJC election period! Oy!

This year we again vote to express our hopes for Israel to thrive as a democratic and Jewish State. Every five years the World Zionist Organization assembles delegates from all Jewish communities worldwide to set policy and allocate resources in support of Israel. The voting begins March 10th, when U.S. Jews select delegates to the 39th World Zionist Congress (WZC), which convenes in Jerusalem in October. We are allocated 152 delegates, about one third of the total, and we select them by a vote for one of 22 U.S. slates, including that of the Reform movement. Delegates are apportioned from the slates based on the vote.

To vote, first sign up at www.arza.org to learn more. When you Vote Reform, you help to increase the number of delegates who will send a strong signal to the WZC about our values of democracy, pluralism, shared society, security, and fighting antisemitism. Our ARZA guest speaker will describe how the WZC influences life in Israel at the Brotherhood Breakfast on April 27th.

And then on Friday, May 2nd, plan to attend a special reception at 5:00 pm for two Israelis visiting Tulsa. They are here to make a personal connection to the challenges of bringing peace to the region since October 7th, and will be speaking from the bima during the Shabbat Service at 6 pm.
