RABBI REMARKS

It is with bittersweet emotion that I share these words with you. Like the maror that we eat from the Passover Seder plate, the bitterness I am experiencing is strong, pungent, and a bit spicy. Over these past seven years, I have grown to love our Temple Israel Family. We laughed and cried; we celebrated and mourned.

With all of you as my teachers, I have sat at your feet as you have all been sages to my rabbinate and my life. You have taught me to embrace some of our strongest Jewish values. Emet and Emunah, Truth and Faith

do not always correspond. Yet, they emphasize the importance of living a transcendent life, a life of purpose, filled with meaning, and the wrestling acceptance of a higher power.

Kavod and Derech Eretz resonate through the hallowed walls of our Temple Family. Respect and the Path of the Earth provide us with a framework to live in community. Treating the Other and one another with grace while providing dignity and acknowledging the inherent value as we are created B'tzelem Elohim, in the Image of God. In this same vein, we acknowledge the value of Shalom Bayit, maintaining harmony and respect within our congregational family.

Friends, the most coveted value I am learning, for me personally, is that of Savlanut, Patience. Sometimes, a moment requires us to take a step back, consider the situation, consider our words, act, or perhaps not act. Rash decisions and emotional unrest may often cause more challenges and frustration. I have learned that it is best to be planful and calm... patient.

The sweetness I am experiencing is like that of Torah; the rabbis teach us that Torah is as nourishing as milk and sweet as honey. On Shavuot, we indulge in milk and honey, connecting

our senses to Torah's depth, wealth, and sweetness. My Temple Family, you have given me a gift, for which I am deeply grateful: a sabbatical year. For the past fifteen years, I have selflessly given myself to congregational life, often at the expense of myself, my person, and my family. Seven of those years have been spent with you at Temple Israel.

Very few people receive the blessing of a year in their early 50s to start fresh, rediscover themselves, and renew into the person they are meant to be. This is what you have given me. In the coming year, I plan to study in Israel, complete the Doctor of Ministry degree I am working on through Phillips Theological Seminary, do yoga and meditate, find my center, and rediscover Torah Lishma, learning for the sake of learning.



I am excited to be able to spend the High Holy Days as a Cruising Rabbi in the Caribbean or some far-off sea. In the coming year, I also hope to see thousands of miles of our beautiful country from the saddle of my motorcycle and maybe even learn to work on motorcycles a bit. Of course, I plan to volunteer my time and skills in a meaningful way, making a difference in my little corner of the world.

With bittersweet emotion, I will cherish the memories of the good we have accomplished together. I will continue to learn from the mistakes I have made. I will forever carry Temple Israel in my heart; I am honored to have been a piece of the 111-year story, which comprises Temple Israel's history and the narrative of Jewish life in Tulsa.

I am thankful for all that Temple Israel has given me, for all of this and more.

NEXTDOR CAMPAIGN

We're pleased to share that the Design Development (DD) phase with our architects at Finegold Alexander is now complete! We have officially entered the final phase— Construction Documents (CD)—which will carry us through



the remainder of the project. Reaching this milestone is a major step forward, and you can expect to see visible progress in the coming months. Our Leadership Team continues to meet weekly—often more frequently—to oversee every detail. We are actively working with our architects and consultants on key decisions regarding furnishings, fixtures, heating systems, AV, and more. Here is the projected timeline:

- End of June 2025 Temple will be vacated, and office operations will transition to temporary locations on the Zarrow Campus
- July through September 2025 Bidding, contract awards, and permitting will continue.
- September 2025 Building demolition will occur.
- September 2025 through December 2026 The full construction phase begins.
- December 2026 We move in to our new home!

On the fundraising front, we're making excellent progress! We've now raised over \$12.3 million toward our \$13 million goal. If you haven't yet made a commitment and would like to speak with someone from our team, please don't hesitate to contact Brina—we'd love to connect with you.

At our Sisterhood Shabbat on March 14th, we displayed a WRJ Quilt, Wimple and Tallit. Many of the attendees had comments and questions about the pieces. They tell a wonderful story and are rich in history, not just of Temple Israel but of WRJ as well. I've asked Carol Stahl to write a piece, and she graciously agreed.

In early March of 2025, I received a box of "Precious Cargo" from the President of WRJ. In this box was a beautiful quilt made of 22 squares representing each of the WRJ sisterhoods in the Southwest district 22. We displayed the quilt during Sisterhood Shabbat when Donna Gantner was selected to be our 2025 Queen Esther. The material squares were sent to each Sisterhood and they were to return it so it could be put together for the final presentation. This quilt, along with a tallit and wimple and challah cover, were displayed at WRJ conventions. Installations, Sisterhood Assemblies. Interim Sabbaths. Board Meetings and other special occasions. Our square has our Temple Logo. It depicts the menorah that stands in the sanctuary, created by Donna Matlas, and uses a blue and white theme, representing the colors of Israel. These special items have travelled to many places in the past years and have had a place of honor each time.

Also in the box was the WRJ Wimple. In the early part of 2006 Maura Pollack, a congregant of Temple Israel, was asked to design and make a beautiful wimple to wrap the WRJ torah or any congregational torah in. This was made for the WRJ Biennial held in Tulsa in February 2006. It has been used in ceremonies at many different Temples and was used at the Interim Board Meeting at Green Family Camp in March 2006. It has a hand-painted design and also has embroidered squares around the outside edge.

Another treasure is the WRJ Tallit. This was made at an Interim Board Meeting by the WRJ Executive Committee in 2004. It also has been used as a chuppah that new board members stood under when they were installed.

Going to a major function like a convention or Interim Board meeting and seeing these things displayed is one of the most awe-inspiring things that I have ever experienced. I highly recommend it. I felt the love in every corner of the room.
