RABBI REMARKS

As I write this, I am packing and planning for my move to Tulsa. Temple Israel will be the fifth congregation that I have served as an intentional interim rabbi. The fifth time that I pack everything up in my home and my synagogue office. The fifth time that I take a journey to a new place.

I move often enough that family and friends now ask me for hacks and advice. And the biggest truth that I can share about about moving is that it is a transition that takes more time and emotion than you expect. It takes time to get ready to move and it takes time to unpack and get settled. There is always at least one thing that goes missing, which often is found during the next move. Despite the effort of moving, there are always wonderful rewards including some unexpected discoveries in the new place.

This will be the very first time that the synagogue that I am serving as interim rabbi will also be moving. With the NextDor Project, Temple Israel is creating a new vibrant and inclusive space for the next generations. There is a great deal to organize, to pack, and to move into the temporary spaces that we will be using on the Charles Schusterman Jewish Community Center campus. Moving means that there will be at least one time this year when our personal sense of “I am going to Temple” will lead us to Utica Square and not further south to where we will be worshipping together, learning together, and celebrating together. I can predict that there will be excitement about the new building, apprehension about the change, and even with lots of planning and preparation, sometimes a sense of discomfort while we are out of the building for the next 18 months. There will be at least one thing that goes missing. There will be some wonderful discoveries about our sacred community while we are temporarily on 71st Street as well as further discoveries when returning to our new building on 22nd Place.

During this time of moving locations, Temple Israel will also be thinking about what rabbinic leadership will look like after Rabbi Michael Weinstein. I can predict that there will be excitement about a new rabbi, apprehension about the change, and a great deal of uncertainty. My rabbinic role will be to partner with our congregation to encourage you to be as thoughtful about this process as you have been about the NextDor project.

What I enjoy about being an interim rabbi is the opportunity to work with sacred communities that are in transition, to be a part of those communities for the year, and to strive to set things up for the success of the incoming settled rabbi.

I am excited to be headed to Tulsa, to be your interim rabbi, and to move with you through the planning for what is next. I look forward to meeting you and learning more about Temple Israel through your eyes. As I write this article, I am sitting among boxes, packing tape and moving supplies. Your Temple Israel team has been busy packing and preparing for our big move and garage sale! While the first Shabbat Service in the Sylvan Auditorium at the JCC will be on Friday, July 4th, we won't actually be moving our Temple Israel offices until the week of July 7th. The address of our new office space is 6914 South Yorktown Avenue, which is conveniently next door to the JCC campus. We are grateful to Jim Jakubovitz and Zarrow Pointe for making this 6000

square foot office space available to us! In addition to offices for clergy and staff we will have a large, approximately 1200 square foot room which will be available for small gatherings and events. We will have some storage space on site, as well. Our office is located on the second floor of the building and is accessible by stairs and by elevator. Construction is currently under way to give us access to our office space by driving on to the JCC campus. We will provide updates for you through the Temple Israel iTinerary.

Packing, moving, and unpacking is quite a process, and it will take some time for us to be completely settled. Forwarding mail, setting up a new server, WiFi, cameras, telephone system etc. are all part of this process. We ask for your patience, support and understanding during this time of transition during the first two weeks of July. Once we are completely settled, we will host an Open House and invite members of the Temple Israel Family to come tour our new office space.

We will continue to provide Shabbat services, Shorashim, Midrasha, congregational dinners and a variety of engaging programs on the JCC campus, and we look forward to the opportunities to work collaboratively with The Sherwin Miller Museum, Zarrow Pointe, Mizel, and the Federation. We are truly lucky to be part of such a supportive Tulsa Jewish community!

I am thrilled to take on the role of Director of Education for our congregation as of July 1, 2025. Over the past two years, I've had the privilege of getting to know our students and families through teaching at Shorashim and Midrasha, and most recently serving as Assistant Director of Education. As part of the revived Adult Education Committee, I've also enjoyed spending time teaching and learning with many of you. I've felt your support and encouragement along the way, and for that, many thanks.

For twenty years, I've been a teacher in some fashion or another. beginning as a high school English teacher, then teaching in adjunct roles at Tulsa Community College. After graduating from the University of Tulsa College of Law, I practiced family law and joined the faculty of my alma mater as a professor. I began to feel the pull back to full time education, this time with a new direction on my heart. I wanted to become a Jewish educator, to study our Jewish texts, traditions, and values, then teach and learn alongside our kids...and you! I consider myself fortunate beyond words to step into this role in our congregation.

Over the past year and through the summer, our Youth Education Committee has tirelessly planned all the ways our education programs will stay strong while in our temporary space. Shorashim will use the state-of-the-art classrooms, playground, and activity spaces in Mizel. With the Federation and the Sherwin Miller Museum of Jewish Art adjacent to the school, we gain access to learning opportunities outside the classroom, right down the hall! We would like to see students spend more time with our Zarrow residents, too.

Our teens will continue to gather on Wednesdays for Midrasha, and they still flock to BBYO! Our Elul study, Tu B'Shevat seder, and Purim mask making classes were a hit last year, so more adult learning opportunities are in the works. With access to resources at the JCC campus, we can offer dynamic programming and expand the horizons of our Jewish learning.

Our congregation faces a myriad of changes. As your educator, I plan to use new resources and opportunities, while always honoring and preserving traditions that form the fabric of Temple Israel's Jewish education legacy. Thank you once again for this opportunity to serve our congregation. See you at back to school!

Of Note: A Unique Adult Education Opportunity

Under the direction of Dr. Miriam Belmaker, the University of Tulsa will launch a minor in Judaic and Near Eastern Studies this Fall. Dr. Belmaker, an archeologist, will teach "Archeology and the Lands of the Bible." The minor also offers Hebrew, from beginner to intermediate, taught by distinguished visiting professor, Dr. Danielle Gurevitch. Both professors are distinguished members of our Tulsa Jewish community. Dr. Belmaker's course and Hebrew Beginning I can be audited through TU's Lifelong Unabridged Program.

- jelly

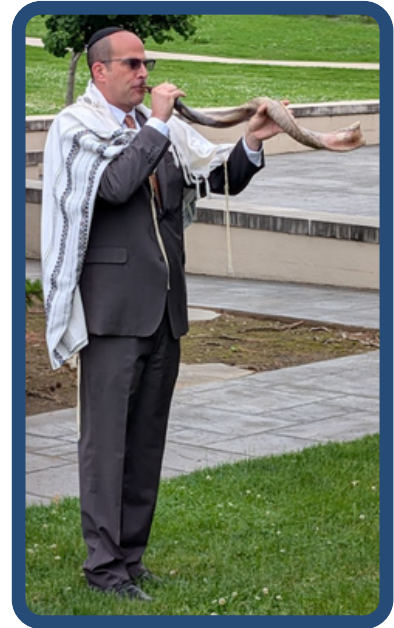

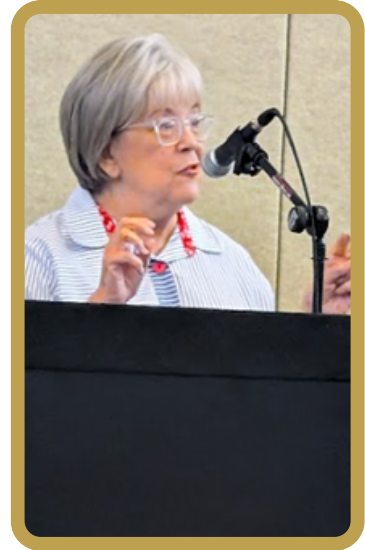
As we move into the summer months, I must admit I am looking forward to a slower pace, no school for a while and slightly warmer weather—key word, “slightly.” I can only hope.

We Won! We Lost! We Can Win!



With our help the Vote Reform slate won the most votes in the election of U.S. delegates to this fall's World Zionist Congress (WZC). However, centrist/progressive/liberal delegates lost our enduring majority for the second congress in a row. In 2020, during the COVID era and WZC and U.S. election campaigns, the left and right sparring increased, and the right gained a majority. Our voting bloc of the 152 member U.S. delegation slipped to 41% for 2025.

This October the WZC will convene in Jerusalem to set policy that influences a billion dollars in funding for social and cultural programs and organizations in Israel. The Jewish Agency for Israel, JAFI, has long been the leading organization to develop Israel and Israel's connection to the Diaspora. The Reform and Progressive Judaism movement has partnered with JAFI on programs that benefit marginalized or minority Israelis, and the expected shift to the right could challenge our interests.

We lost a round, but we can charge out of our corner to defend Reform Judaism and Jewish values in Israel. How? Join ARZA for 5786/2026! A family membership is \$50, and you can have Temple Israel include it in your dues billing. Israel is home to all Jews, and with your help we can maintain that concept regardless of the WZC's expected tilt toward an Orthodox form of nationalism.

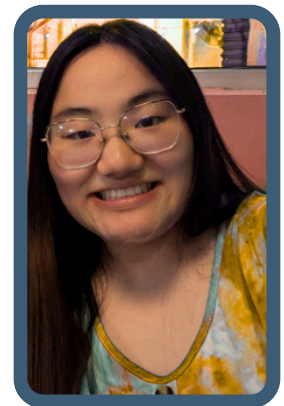
