RABBI REMARKS

Interim Rabbi***Giving Thanks in Every Season***

We usually think of Sukkot as a fall harvest festival—a week of shaking the *lulav* and *etrog*, and eating in the sukkah with the stars visible through the leafy roof. But actually, we celebrate Sukkot two other times each year: at Thanksgiving and at Hanukkah.

Thanksgiving, as many of us learned in school, was modeled in part on the biblical harvest festivals described in Leviticus. The Pilgrims wanted to thank God for their first harvest in a new land. Whether or not they knew the words **z'man simchateinu**—our season of rejoicing—they understood that gratitude for abundance, community, and survival is sacred. Even if our thinking about the Pilgrims is more nuanced now, there is a benefit to creating the time for giving thanks, for remembering that bounty is not guaranteed and that our gratitude can move us to care for others.

A few weeks later, we reach Hanukkah, which may seem far removed from Sukkot. Yet the stories of the Maccabees tell us that when the Temple was rededicated in Jerusalem, the people were actually celebrating Sukkot, because the harvest festival was delayed by war. That's why Hanukkah lasts eight days: the same length as Sukkot. When the Temple was restored, light returned—just as we bring light into our homes when nights are longest.

The rabbis taught, “In the world to come, all sacrifices will cease, but the sacrifices of thanksgiving will never cease; all prayers will cease, but prayers of thanksgiving will never cease” (Vayikra Rabbah 9:7). Gratitude, they remind us, is eternal.

So whether we're sitting at a Thanksgiving table or lighting the Hanukkah menorah, we are still, in a sense, in the sukkah: giving thanks for harvest, for shelter, and for renewed hope.

NEXTDOR UPDATE

The Leadership Team for the Next Dor Project is delighted to share exciting progress on our new house of worship. We recently received several highly competitive construction bids, marking an important milestone in bringing our vision to life. As we go to press, we are working closely with our nationally recognized architectural firm, Finegold Alexander, along with our talented team of local engineers, to “value engineer” the project. This means we’re identifying opportunities to reduce costs without compromising the aesthetics, quality, or integrity of our design. Several promising adjustments have already been found, and we continue to evaluate additional options before finalizing the overall construction cost.

Our commitment remains firm: this new space will be a showcase for the Jewish community and for all of Tulsa, reflecting beauty, functionality, and enduring quality. We anticipate signing a construction contract by the end of October, with demolition and construction set to begin soon after.

Current estimates indicate that construction will take approximately 65 weeks—about one year and 13 weeks—barring unforeseen delays. If work begins by December 1, completion is expected in the first quarter of 2027, aligning closely with our original timeline. Fun fact: the Empire State Building was famously completed in just one year and 45 days! While our project is a bit different, we’re inspired by that spirit of efficiency and optimism as we move forward.

We are truly on the cusp of seeing the collective vision and hard work of so many come to life—literally from the ground up. What a meaningful way to begin the Jewish New Year! Thank you for your continued support, enthusiasm, and dedication as we move together into this exciting next phase.




