RABBI REMARKS

***What Tu B'Shevat Teaches About Growth***

Tu B'Shevat, the 15th day of the Hebrew month of Shevat, begins this year on the evening of February 2. Originally, it was not a festival at all—it was a date on the calendar for determining the “birthday” of trees so our ancestors could calculate tithes. In its earliest form, Tu B'Shevat had more to do with taxes than with trees.

Over time, though, the day grew deeper roots. In the 16th century, Jewish mystics in Tzfat, in the northern part of

Eretz Israel, created a seder using fruits and the produce of the land to explore the four seasons and the four spiritual realms of Lurianic Kabbalah. The holiday that began as an agricultural bookkeeping necessity became a doorway into wonder.

In the modern era, Tu B'Shevat has taken on yet another layer: as a connection to the Land of Israel, where the almond trees begin to bloom, just as winter still surrounds us here in Tulsa. Even when the landscape is quiet, the sap is rising. Something is happening beneath the surface—slow, steady, and full of promise.

Tu B'Shevat also calls us toward environmental responsibility. Judaism teaches that we are stewards of creation, and our tradition emphasizes the care of trees specifically. This year, as we continue work on our new building, the protection and preservation of the surrounding trees has been one of our concerns. How we shape our physical space reflects our values.

The holiday reminds us that growth requires nourishment. Just as trees need water, sunlight, and time, our sacred community depends on the contributions—financial, spiritual, and emotional—of those who call it home. Judaism can seem mysterious, yet connection can begin with something as simple as mindfully eating fruit.

Most of all, Tu B'Shevat teaches patience and hope. We plant seeds when we can. Growth follows its own season. It may appear slow, but eventually we witness the beauty of what we have nurtured together.

I'm not a fan of daylight saving time! I don't know about you, but when it's dark at 6 PM, I am wondering why I am not in bed already. The dark is, well, dark, and it seems to make everything a bit more difficult.

Over and over, our tradition understands that in the midst of darkness, our people always created light. It is simply who we are. The Torah is referred to as a "light", guiding ethical behavior and spiritual growth. We just celebrated Hanukkah, the festival of lights, emphasizing hope and resilience.

We are choosing light at Temple Israel as we move forward with our NextDor project; building our beautiful new Temple! We are anxiously awaiting the official groundbreaking ceremony. We continue to meet the needs of our congregation by creating a welcoming space in the Sylvan Auditorium at the Jewish Community Center. We are continuing to offer meaningful programming and congregational dinners.

More exciting news: We have asked Rabbi Appel to stay with us for a second year, and she has agreed! We will be forming our new search committee to help us find a new settled rabbi. This process will begin in March 2026.

We have also hired a new Director of Outreach and Engagement. Zach Singer began in mid-December, and we hope you have had a chance to meet him. Please see Zach's profile on page 13.

For this edition of the BulleTIn, I would like to reiterate my message from Social Justice Shabbat. Our religion requires us to be active participants in repairing the world. Deuteronomy instructs us, "Justice, justice, shall you pursue." Psalm 82 exhorts us to "give justice to the weak and the fatherless, maintain the right of the afflicted and the destitute." Micah tell us to "do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with your God." Commandments to do justice run through our scriptures like veins through marble, inseparable and integral to the beauty and strength of the whole.

Can ARZA Survive Zionism?



The word and concept of Zionism (developed at the end of the 19th century) has different meanings for different people, and, unfortunately, is being used by some in a negative way in the public square and in social media, especially since October 7, 2023.

How can we, as Reform Jews living in Tulsa, as Zionists, support the existence of the state of Israel as a homeland for the Jewish people despite the challenges? Fortunately, the strength of the network of interfaith organizations and programming helps us maintain dialogue. While we might tend to avoid using the word "Zionism" for fear of dividing or ending the conversation, it remains important to affirm our support for the existence of the State of Israel as a refuge, while allowing room for disagreement about the actions of its government. The Reform Movement is very vocal in its support for Israel, and it is important that we not cloak or diminish our support.

I believe that ARZA can thrive in its work to encourage, legitimize, and even celebrate Zionism with our support. As Reform Jews we understand that we view Israel from a unique perspective. We see this unique perspective in Israel in the Israeli Reform movement's focus on social justice, human rights, and promoting peace.
