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RABBI REMARKS

Just weeks after crossing the Sea of Reeds on dry land—from slavery to freedom—the Israelites stand at Mount Sinai and enter into covenant. Several weeks later, they begin building the Mishkan, the wilderness Tabernacle. Less than a year after leaving Egypt, they will complete and dedicate it. A tight construction timeline, as we well know.

For some, this section of the Torah about the Mishkan is beautiful in its own right: blue, purple, and crimson yarns; gold and silver; skilled hands, coming together to shape sacred space. Everyone contributes according to their ability. The artisans bring skill. Others bring materials. Some simply bring willingness. There is such eagerness to contribute that Moses tells the people to stop giving. There is such eagerness to build that Moses must remind the people to pause for Shabbat. Even creative work for something as important as God’s dwelling place is constrained by Shabbat.

For others, the repetitive nature of this section of the Torah is annoying and the very idea itself is unsettling. How can the Holy One dwell in a tent? How can the Ein Sof, the Infinite One, be contained by the fabric walls of the Mishkan? And yet the promise is clear: “Let them make Me a sanctuary that I may dwell among them” (Exodus 25:8). Not in it—among them. The sacred presence will dwell in the result of the shared act of building as a sacred community.

It can be easy to feel as though we are in a wilderness right now. The cherished building that housed Temple Israel for decades is gone. The new building is not yet complete. We gather in temporary spaces. There is grief about what was. There is apprehension about what is. There is excitement about what might be.

William Bridges, in his work on transition, reminds us that change is external, but transition is internal. He names three stages: an ending, a neutral zone, and a new beginning. We are living in all three at once. We have said goodbye to a building that held our memories. We are in the in-between—improvising, adjusting, sometimes feeling unmoored. And we are already imagining what comes next.

On Sunday, April 12, at 3:30 p.m., at 2004 East 22nd Place, we will gather for our groundbreaking and celebrate what comes next. It will not erase the grief. It will not eliminate the uncertainty. But it will mark something essential: that we are building together as a sacred community, creating sacred spaces as we move forward.

Maybe a time capsule that was placed there in 1956 when the Temple was built? Who knows what it contains? We will open it on April 12th and find out.

My friends, as our project progresses, we will need your continued support, your patience during construction, and your enthusiasm as we bring our dream to life.

students stack apples with our URJ Camp Greene visitor and learn how summer camp is fun! Midrasha student pack their bags for their Spring Break trip to Los Angeles, exploring the Jewish community and culture. Adults visit over snacks as they study text and tradition. We are a community of lifelong learners, making our Jewish Journey together.

TEMPLE ENGAGEMENT

The Temple Israel offices where I work sit on the JCC campus. From my desk, I look out at the Jewish Federation building, the same place where some of my earliest and most formative memories were made as a student at Heritage Academy, now the Mizel Jewish Community Day School. That view is not lost on me because across town, the original Temple Israel building—the one that stood for generations—is being carefully rebuilt. Not erased. Rebuilt to reflect the strength, future, and prosperity of Jewish life in Tulsa. And I arrived during that moment.

My connection to Temple Israel did not begin with this role. My father grew up here. He became a Bar Mitzvah on that bimah, served as president of AZA, and formed friendships that shaped an entire generation. Temple Israel was a foundation for identity, leadership, and lifelong connection. So when I stepped into this position, I understood something immediately: I was not entering a new story. I was stepping into an ongoing one.

Recently, the Ten Commandments were carefully cut from the Temple building and lifted away to be preserved for the new building. I had the honor of filming this moment. Standing behind my camera, watching the precision and care it took to accomplish, I realized I was witnessing more than construction. The commandments were not discarded with the walls around them. They were carried forward and held with intention.

In a time when many institutions are shrinking or disappearing, Temple Israel chose to rebuild while protecting what matters most. There is something profoundly Jewish about arriving during demolition. Not at the ribbon cutting, not after the dust settles, but in the middle, when faith is required to see what is not yet visible.

My work centers on storytelling and connection. How we show up online, in the city, and with one another. I see our social media platforms as invitations into belonging. Through video, I aim to document this season of transition—whether filming Temple Israel at the MLK Day Parade or capturing quieter moments that deserve to be remembered.


I experience all of this now as a father. I think about children forming early Jewish memories, what it means to grow up Jewish in Oklahoma by intention, and how the spaces we build today will shape lives long after we are gone. *L'dor v'dor*, from generation to generation, is visible here. My father stood on that bimah as a boy. Now I help document its next chapter. Rebuilding is not just about walls. It is about remembering who we are, and choosing—together—to continue.




